



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The Queen's heritage (The Royal Family)



The monarchy of the United Kingdom



- → commonly referred to as the British monarchy
- → constitutional form of government
- → monarch and their immediate family undertake various official, ceremonial, diplomatic and representational duties
- → being constitutional, the monarch is limited to functions such as bestowing honors and appointing the prime minister
- → performed in a non-partisan manner
- → also able to advise to change draft laws
- → Head of the British Armed Forces
- powers may only be used according to laws enacted in Parliament and within the constraints of convention and precedent
- → Government of the United Kingdom is known as His Majesty's Government.

The Windsors and Germany

- → House of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha:
 - → gained considerable influence in Europe in the 19th century through clever marriage policy
 - → Prince Albert of Coburg was finally associated with his cousin, Queen Victoria, in 1840.
- \rightarrow House of Hanover:
 - → first two Hanoverian rulers on the English throne,
 George I and George II, were born and raised in Hanover
 - → also Electors of Brunswick-Lüneburg and kings in the sovereign Kingdom of Hanover
 - → the rule of the House of Hanover over the Empire lasted until Victoria's death in 1901.
- → Prince Phillip could speak German fluently. King Charles III can also speak a bit of German.
- ightarrow Queen Elizabeth visited Germany seven times



The Queen's life before reign

- → Elisabeth Mary Alexandra (*21 April 1926)
- → beginning of WW2: she stayed in Britain
- → end of the war: she joined the Auxiliary Territorial Service
- → Princess Elizabeth and Philip Mountbatten's wedding: Westminster Abbey in London, Thursday, 20 November 1947
- → birth of her first child, Prince Charles, on 14 November 1948
- → birth of second child, Princess Anne, on 15 August 1950









The Queen's early reign time

- → Elizabeth II: 6 February 1952 at the age of twenty-five
- → head of the Commonwealth and the reigning queen of seven countries: Great Britain, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, Pakistan and Ceylon
- → coronation ceremony took place at Westminster Abbey on 2 June 1953
- → first coronation of a British monarch to be televised
- → from Elizabeth's birth onwards, the British Empire continued its transformation into the Commonwealth of Nations
- → in 1953, Elizabeth and her husband embarked on a seven-month round-the-world tour,
- → the first reigning monarch of Australia and New Zealand to visit those nations.
- → 1960s and 1970s: decolonization of Africa and the Caribbean
- → more than 20 countries gained independence from Britain as part of a planned transition to self-government.





The Queen's late reign time

- → 26 March 1976: first head of state to send an email
- → ARPANET at an IT conference at the Royal Research Institution
- → passed Silver Jubilee, Golden Jubilee, Diamond Jubilee and Platinum Jubilee
- → visited 116 countries during her reign time
- → saw 15 prime ministers from Winston Churchill to Liz Truss
- \rightarrow played an important role of representing the UK as a symbol of the country





The Queen's death and funeral

- → 8 September 2022: Elizabeth II, Queen of the United Kingdom and the other Commonwealth realms, and the oldest living and longest-reigning British monarch, died at the age of 96 at Balmoral Castle in Aberdeenshire, Scotland.
- → publicly announced at 18:30 BST
- ightarrow succeeded by her eldest child, Charles III
- \rightarrow a national mourning period of 10 days
- → Westminster Hall from 14 to 19 September: an estimated 250,000 people queued to pay their respects
- → state funeral service at Westminster Abbey on 19 September, followed by a committal service at St George's Chapel at Windsor Castle



Interesting facts about the Queen

- \rightarrow neither passport nor driving license
- → loved corgi dog breed
- → recently, two corgis lived with the Queen
- → married to Prince Philip for over 73 years
- → birthday was celebrated twice a year
- → born on 21 April 1926, but celebrated on a Saturday in June
